It is our privilege to present Cherokee Nation’s Popular Annual Financial Report for fiscal year ended September 30, 2024 (FY24). This report is part of our continued effort at government accountability, transparency, and keeping you, the Cherokee citizens, better informed. You will find brief descriptive information about the Cherokee Nation, its service departments, and programs in a manner that is easy to read and understand.

The financial information presented in this report is derived from the Cherokee Nation’s Fiscal Year 2024 Annual Comprehensive Financial Report (ACFR), but presented here in a summarized format. The ACFR is prepared in conformance with generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP) and includes financial statements audited by an independent accounting firm. The financial statements included in this report reflect only the Cherokee Nation government operations, and are presented in an unaudited, non-GAAP format. For your information for Cherokee Nation’s Component Units contact can be found on page 18.

The Cherokee Nation is a sovereign Indian Nation. Upon settling in Indian Territory (present-day Oklahoma) after the Indian Removal Act, the Cherokee people established a new government in what is now the city of Tahlequah, Oklahoma. A constitution was adopted in September of 1839, 68 years prior to Oklahoma's statehood. The Cherokee Nation government, like the United States government, consists of three branches: legislative, executive, and judicial. The three branches are separate and distinct, providing for a system of checks-and-balances.

Today, the Cherokee Nation is the largest tribe in the United States with more than 467,000 citizens worldwide. More than 140,000 Cherokee Nation citizens reside within the 14-county tribal Reservation area that covers most of northeastern Oklahoma. The tribe provides services that include health and human services, education, employment, housing, economic and infrastructure development, and environmental protection.

Cherokee society is historically a matrilineal society, and clanship is attained through the mother. Prior to Oklahoma statehood, the women were considered the head of household. The knowledge of a person's clan is important. Clan members are considered brothers and sisters and it is forbidden to marry within the same clan.

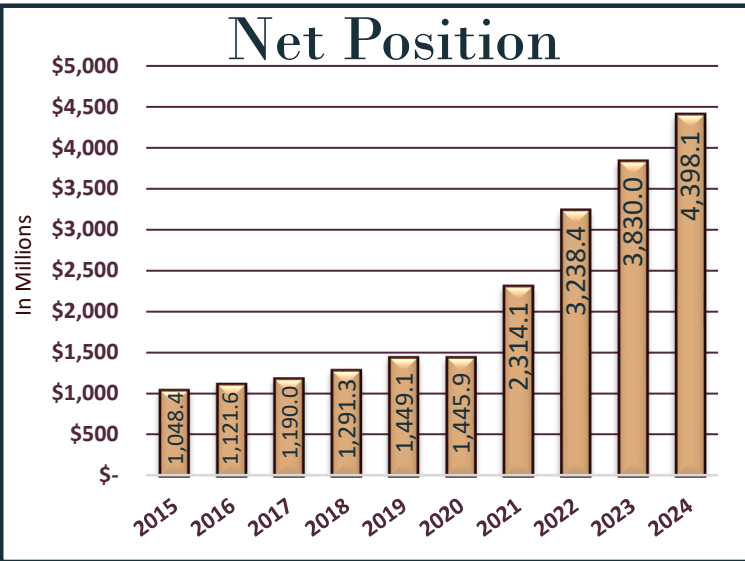


Mission Statement

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The Cherokee Nation is committed to protecting our inherent sovereignty, preserving and promoting Cherokee culture, language and values, and improving the quality of life for the next seven generations of Cherokee Nation citizens.

Net position is the value of the tribe's assets less its liabilities. At the end of FY24, the Nation's net position increased to **\$4.4b**. Of this total amount, **\$758.2m** are unrestricted funds that may be used by the tribal government.

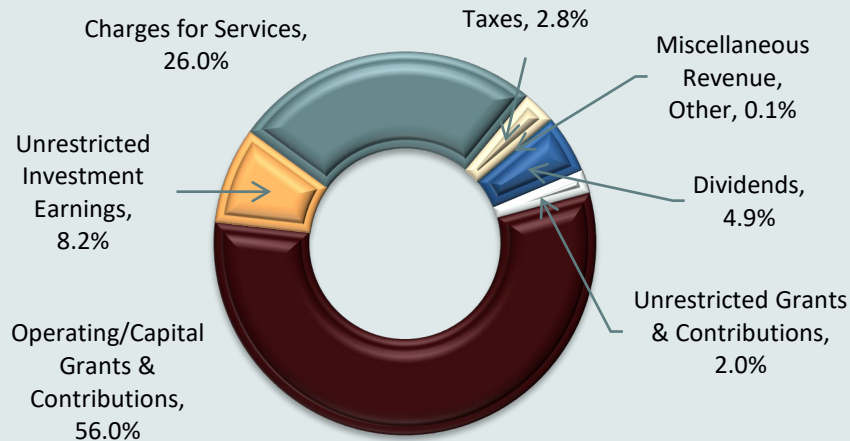

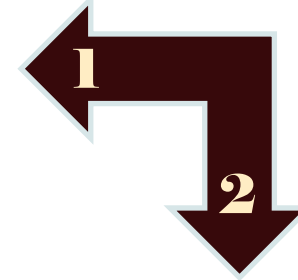

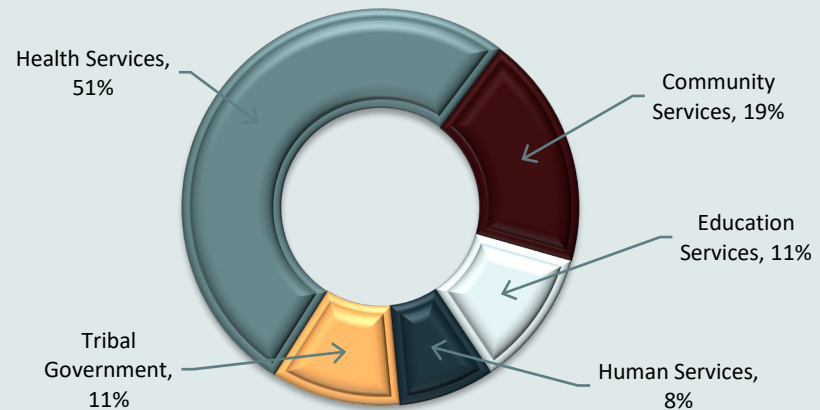
Graph 1 depicts revenues by funding source for the Governmental Activities of the Cherokee Nation.

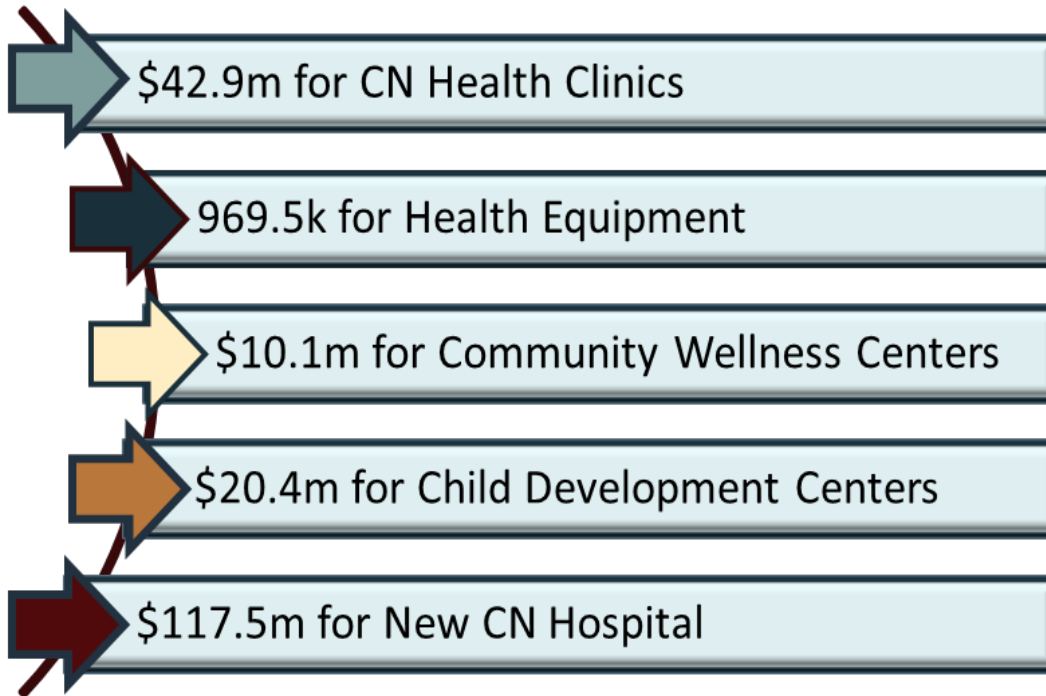

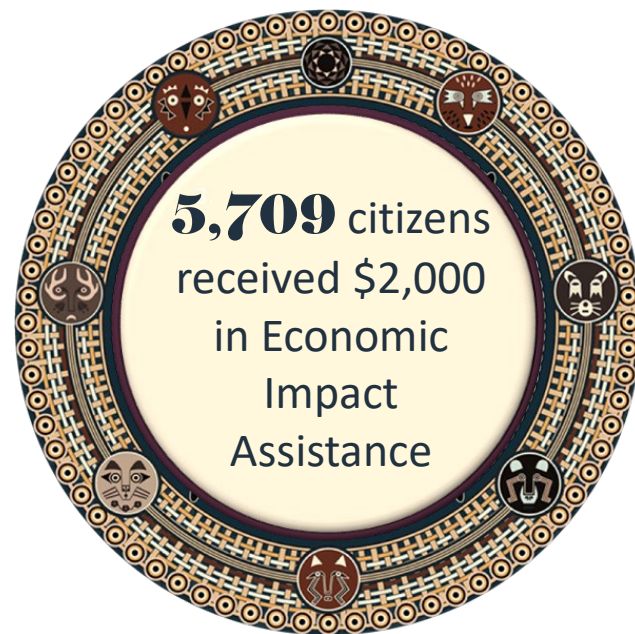

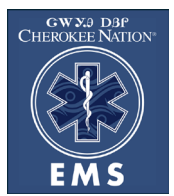

Cherokee Nation Emergency Medical Services (CNEMS) is a state licensed paramedic level ambulance service. The Nation invested \$3.1m in FY24, acquiring a fleet of new state-of-the-art ambulances to better serve tribal citizens during emergencies.

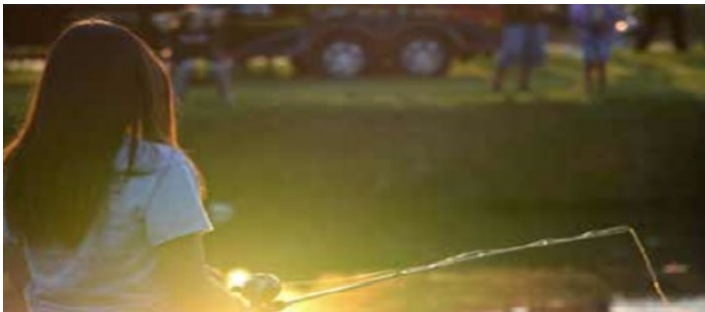
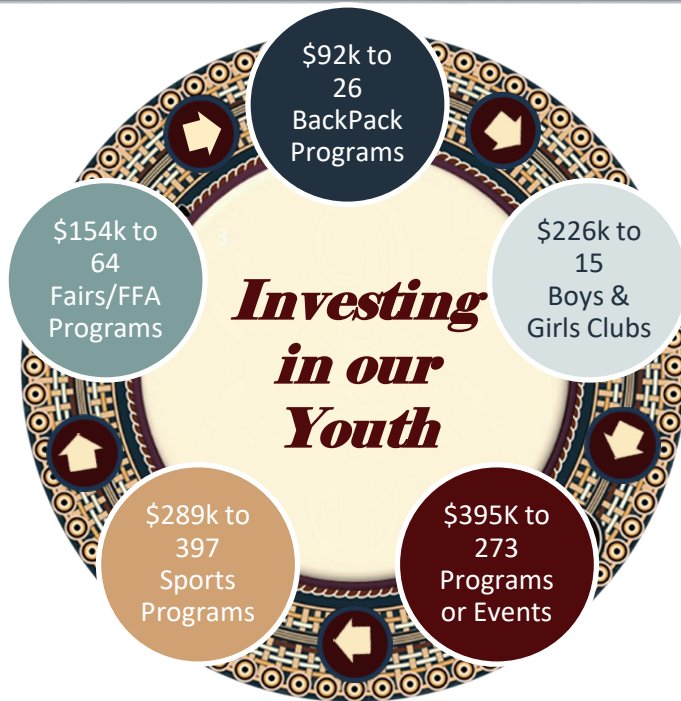


Early Childhood - ᵀᵀᵀᵀᵀᵀ ᵀᵀᵀᵀᵀᵀ

Cherokee Nation Early Childhood services include both Headstart and Cherokee Nation Child Care and Development (CDC). The HeadStart is based on the philosophy that a child can benefit most from a comprehensive program to foster development through the involvement of the child's entire family as well as the community. CN saw 851 children enrolled and invested \$14.4m into the HeadStart programs.

The Cherokee Nation CDC is a program to increase the availability, affordability, and quality of childcare and provide training opportunities for parents. In FY24, Cherokee Nation spent \$46.9m to support our 8 CDC centers and 635 contracted childcare providers.

The Cherokee Nation has a more than **\$3 billion** impact on the Oklahoma economy.



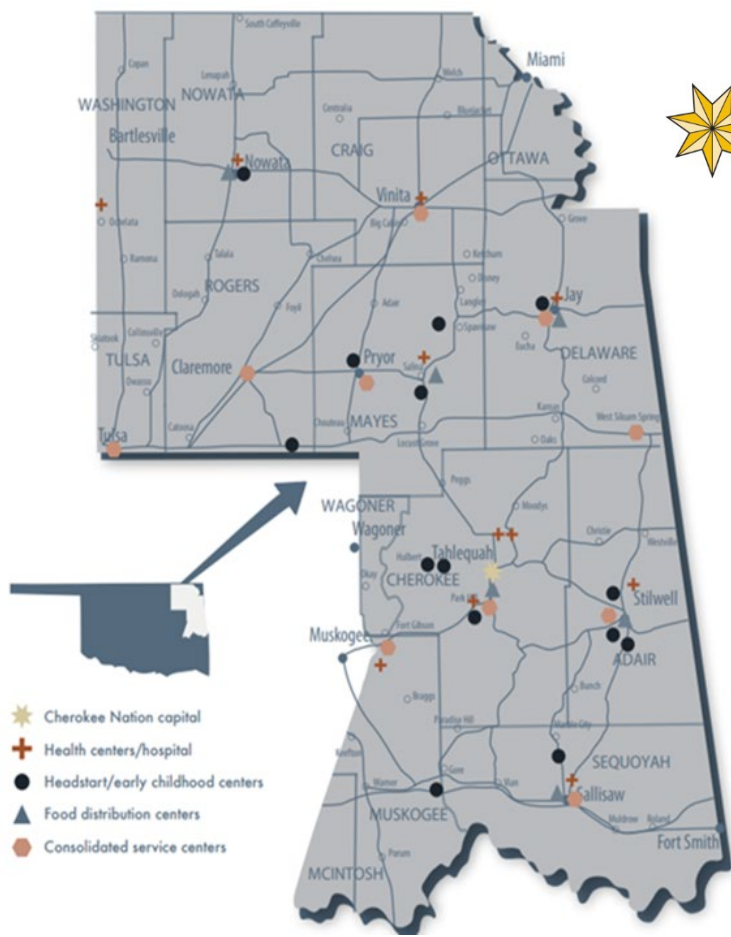
Seed Bank - ᄇᄂᄂᄂ ᄂᄂᄂ - The heirloom seed program focuses on preserving and revitalizing cultural plants and crops used by Cherokees for food and cultural purposes. CN distributed 9,668 seed packages to tribal citizens in FY24.

Environmental Programs (CNEP) - ᄂᄂᄂ ᄂᄂᄂ ᄂᄂᄂ - CNEP conducts formal environmental reviews to examine the potential effects associated with any changes to an environment, such as building rehabilitation, utility expansion, land acquisition, and/or new construction. In FY24, CNEP performed 1,304 reviews were throughout northeast Oklahoma.

Cherokee Nation Transit - ᄂᄂᄂ ᄂᄂᄂ ᄂᄂᄂ - In FY24 Cherokee Nation spent \$1.7m providing people throughout the reservation a safe, cost-effective (50¢ per ride), efficient, eco-friendly way to travel between our communities while reducing our carbon footprint. 94,909 transit rides were provided in FY24.

Community and Cultural Outreach (CCO) - ᄂᄂᄂ ᄂᄂᄂ ᄂᄂᄂ ᄂᄂᄂ ᄂᄂᄂ - CCO is a grassroots network that consists of 87 Cherokee community organizations throughout the United States. The Cherokee Nation spent \$1.3m on outreach and community assistance in FY24.

Strong communities are important to the Cherokee people. Cherokee Nation contributes resources to our communities to ensure they remain strong and prosperous.

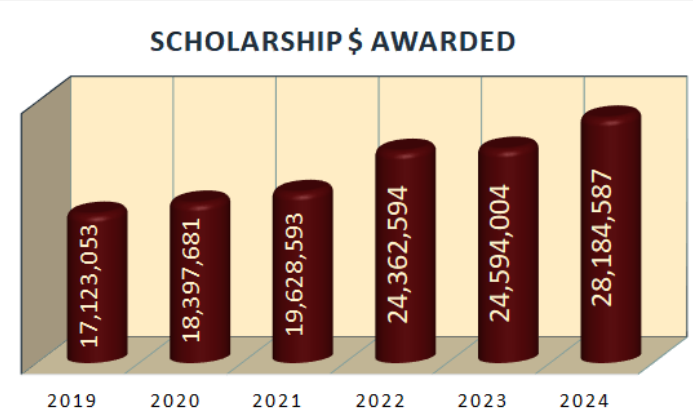
Sequoyah High School is a school of excellence for any Native American student from a federally recognized tribe in grades 9-12. In FY24, the tribe spent \$12.5m educating 318.



Cherokee Immersion School - GWY ᎠᎵᎾᎵ

The Cherokee Immersion School is a Cherokee language preservation school. Curriculum is taught exclusively in the Cherokee language, both written and spoken. In FY24, the school served 126 students in grades pre-K through 8th grade with support totaling \$3.9m.

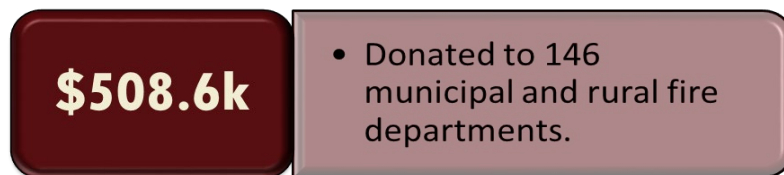
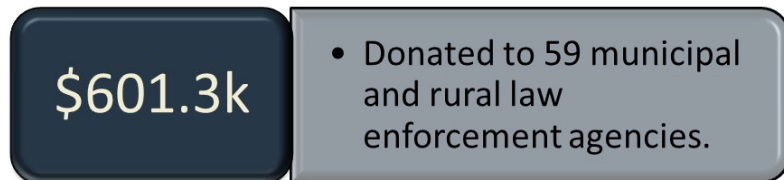
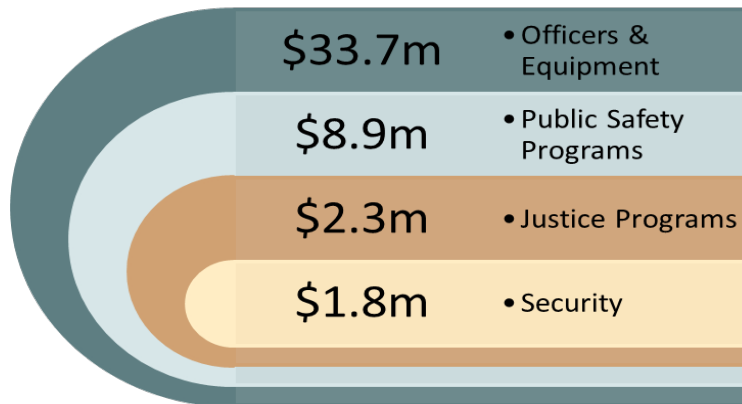


Marshal Service -



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The Cherokee Nation Marshal Service is a certified law enforcement agency with jurisdiction throughout the Cherokee Nation reservation. The Marshal Service is cross-deputized with 91 municipal, county, state, and federal agencies. The Nation invested \$46.7m to keep our Nation and communities safe in FY24.



Small Business Assistance Center (SBA) -

- SBA encourages entrepreneurship services for Cherokee citizens. The SBA provided \$3.7m in commercial loans in FY24 to 40 small businesses creating or maintaining 204 full time jobs within our communities.

Engineering and Sanitation -

ᎠᎩᎩᎩᎩ - In FY24, Cherokee Nation spent \$1.9m of non-ARPA funding on 24.3 miles of community waterlines constructed to improve the quality of life for families and communities by ensuring access to safe water.

Roads - ᎠᎩᎩᎩ - The Roads program improves the quality of life for families and communities by providing safe roads and easier access. CN spent \$34.1m repairing /constructing 74.0 miles of roads and bridges across northeast Oklahoma in FY24.

Job Fairs – ᎠᎩᎩᎩᎩ ᎠᎩᎩᎩᎩ

The Cherokee Nation's Economic Development program works with local communities and partners with businesses to help citizens obtain full time employment. In FY24, CN conducted 28 job fairs in various communities throughout the reservation.

Cherokee families are well known for their strength and resilience. Cherokee Nation provides an array of support programs through family and individual services, including programs designed specifically for children, youth, and elders.

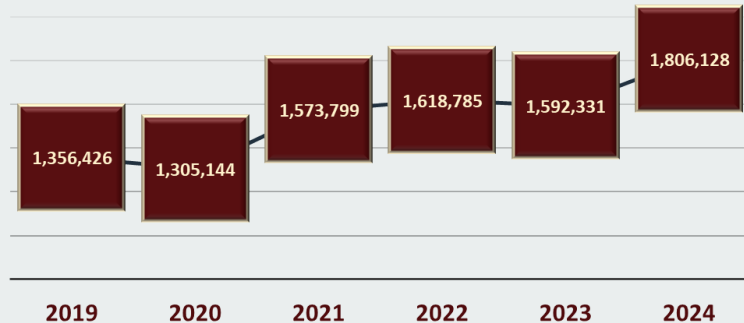

The Cherokee Nation operates the largest tribally managed healthcare system in the United States. The tribe's healthcare system consists of 10 ambulatory health centers, 1 hospital and 1 outpatient health care facility providing a wide variety of physical, dental and mental healthcare to all Native Americans. CN Health Centers had more than 1.8 million patient visits in FY24.

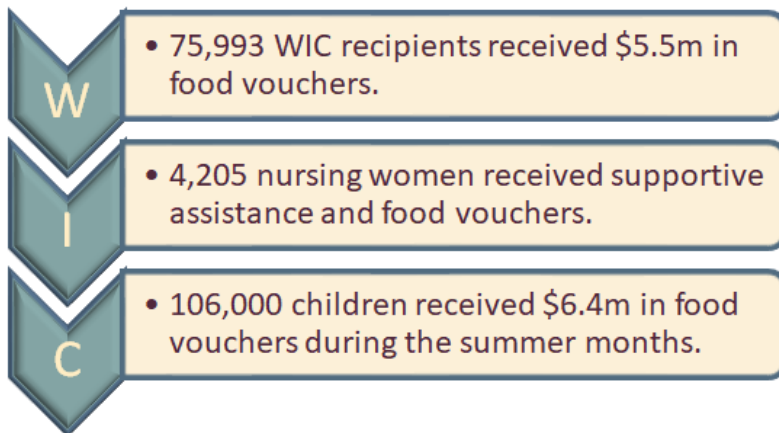

The Indian Child Welfare program is a fully integrated support system for children and families who need stability in times of crisis. In FY24, the Nation spent \$10.1m on ICW programs to provide services to 244, to attend and assist in 273 custody court hearings, and cared for more than 1,200 children monthly through our Foster Care system.

Food Distribution - D̄r̄m̄b̄

D̄j̄s̄d̄m̄j̄ - Due to Cherokee Nation food distribution efforts, 81,814 individual citizens and 44,572 households received food. CN was able to provide 40,765 meals at our elderly at 14 senior nutrition sites and 11,193 served in their homes. In FY24, Cn spent \$11.8m food distribution programs.

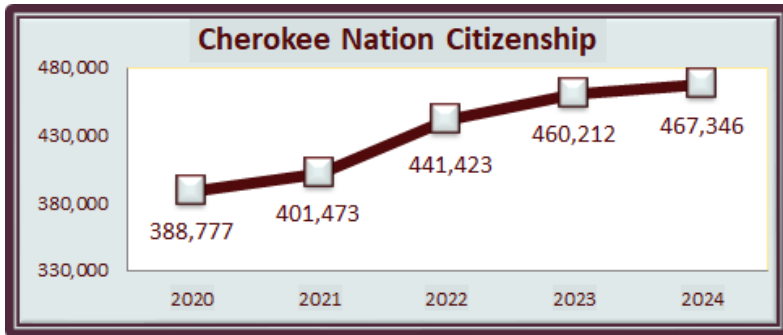
Child Support - D̄h̄C J̄m̄s̄j̄t̄ - The child support program collects court-ordered child support dollars that are then distributed to custodial guardians. The program collected and distributed more than \$3.3m in child support for 2,631 active cases in FY24.

Vocational Education and Training - J̄s̄j̄m̄b̄l̄j̄ j̄m̄s̄t̄m̄j̄ d̄s̄ ōm̄s̄h̄j̄t̄ - The Cherokee Nation offers several in-house training programs and assistance to those who are enrolled at vocational and technical schools. In FY24, Cherokee Nation vocational programs assisted 1,084 Native Americans.

Elder Services & Advocacy - D̄h̄s̄b̄

T̄j̄b̄l̄j̄ & D̄m̄s̄r̄m̄j̄ - Elder Services helps Cherokee elderly to be self-sufficient while ensuring they can remain safely in their homes. In FY24, a total of 1,490 elders were helped with utility assistance, 531 received housing assistance, and 470 were protected and advocated for.

Cherokee culture encompasses our longstanding traditions of language, music, spirituality, food, storytelling and art. Funding programs that teach this culture is a priority for the Cherokee Nation.

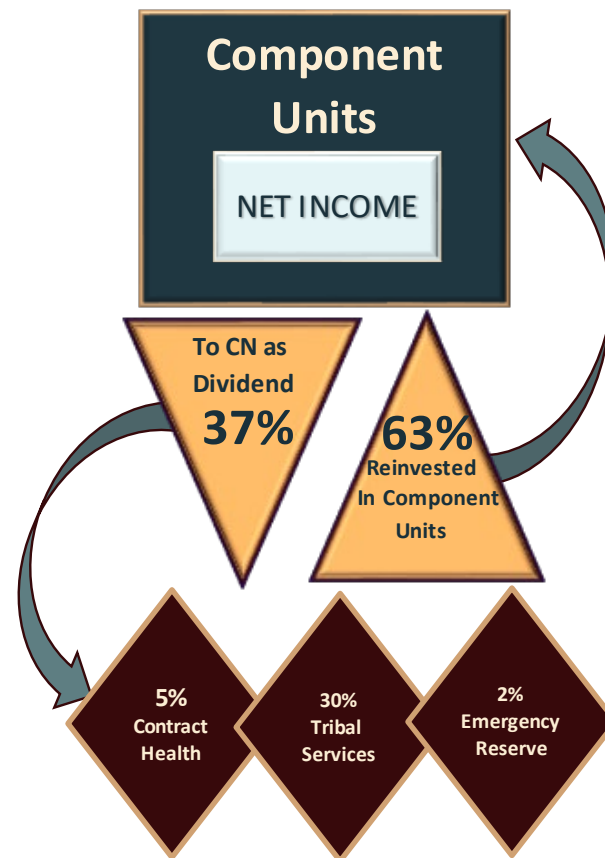
